



COVID-19 Pre-Screen **Update**

OCHD and CDC does not currently recommend universal symptom screenings (screening all students grades K-12) be conducted by schools.

On-site screening may be advised when cases have been identified in the school or if screening can be implemented while maintaining social distancing.

Screening is required before entering the bus or school building. Once an individual arrives at school and they are symptomatic, exposure to students and staff that are close contacts have already occurred. Specific screening requirements are outlined below*.

Safety Protocols

MI Safe Start | Phase 4

- □ Have staff monitor arrival and dismissal to discourage congregating and ensure students go straight from a vehicle to their classrooms and vice-versa.
- Where possible, physical education should be held outside and social distancing of six feet should be practiced.
- Boarding schools should seek guidance from MDHHS regarding spacing, movement, and facility access.
- Flow of foot traffic should be directed in only one direction, if possible. If one-way flow is not possible, hallways should be divided with either side following the same direction.
- Entrances and exits should be kept separate to keep traffic moving in a single direction.

Screening Students and Staff

 Schools must cooperate with the local public health department regarding implementing protocols for screening students and staff.

Strongly Recommended

- Every school should identify and designate a quarantine area and a staff person to care for students who become ill at school.
- □ Students who become ill with symptoms of COVID-19 should be placed in an identified quarantine area with a surgical mask in place until they can be picked up. Identified school staff caring for these children should wear a surgical mask, with the exception of students with special needs requiring aerosolized procedures in which an N95

- mask is required.
- Symptomatic students sent home from school should be kept home until they have tested negative or have completely recovered according to CDC guidelines.
- ☐ Staff should conduct daily self-examinations, including a temperature check, prior to coming to work. If they exhibit any respiratory or gastrointestinal symptoms, or have a temperature of 100.4 or greater, they should stay home.

Recommended

- A monitoring form (paper or electronic) for screening employees should be developed.
- ☐ Families are encouraged to check their child's temperature at home every morning using oral, tympanic, or temporal scanners; students with a temperature of 100.4 or greater should stay home and consider coronavirus testing if symptoms of COVID-19 are present.
- ☐ Families are encouraged to monitor their children for symptoms of COVID-19. The presence of any symptoms, including cough or shortness of breath, should prompt the family to keep the student home from school and to follow up with a primary care provider.

Staff and Administration Screening

- Daily screening is required using the Staff and Student Screening Checklist, or a virtual equivalent.
- It is strongly recommended that daily temperature checks are included in the screening for all adults.

Student Screening At Home:

- Every parent/guardian must submit a COVID-19 School Health Screening Acknowledgment form prior to start of school year.
- Parents/guardians must screen daily for symptoms at home, prior to boarding the bus and arrival at school using the Staff and Student Screening Checklist.

Before/After School Activities:

• Schools must conduct screenings prior to after-school and weekend activities, including child care, sports practice, club gatherings, and competitions.

Visitor and Vendor Screening:

- Daily screening is required using the Visitor and Vendor Screening Checklist.
- Adult guests entering the building should be screened for symptoms, wear a face covering and wash/sanitize hands prior to entering. Strict records, including date and time, should be kept of non-school employees or other visitors entering and exiting the building to assist with contact tracing if an exposure occurs.





COVID-19 Pre-Screen **Update**

- Required of students, staff, and visitors/vendors each day/visit
 - Offered digitally or paper
 - Not required to show a screen or paper upon entry of bus or building
 - If the answers indicate a possibility of COVID-19 or COVID exposure, the individual is told not to enter the building and offered Mr. Sanford's contact information
- Families will be reminded weekly to complete the daily screening starting this week

Overall Goal: Find the best interim assessment(s)/screener(s) that meet the needs of the MDE requirements and the needs of various stakeholders at multiple grade bands.

From the Michigan Department of Education: Benchmark (Interim) assessments are used to evaluate a students' knowledge and skills relative to a specific set of academic goals within a limited time frame and are designed to inform decisions at the classroom level and beyond. The results of a benchmark (interim) assessment are meaningfully aggregated and reported at a level beyond the classroom.

Interim Assessment Review/FastBridge Project Timeline

- > 2018-2019 School Year: Feedback captured from teachers suggest the district should initiate an interim-assessment review
- ➤ Winter of 2019: Assessment Review Team is assembled including Wendy Osterman, special education representative, an elem admin, a MS admin, and one teacher from each of the 7 buildings
- December 2019: First meeting to identify objectives
- December 2019-March 2020: team met in-person 3 times
 - > Global Pandemic hit and schools were closed prior to our scheduled March 17th Day meeting with the various representatives
- > Spring 2020: Asynchronous exploring, videos, and surveying was done to guide next steps
- Spring 2020: FastBridge and i-Ready were moved forward with virtual meetings with their representatives
- Final vote in May was unanimous for choosing FastBridge
- May 2020: Approval from Superintendent to move forward
- > Spring/Summer/Fall 2020: 2 days of Train-the-Trainers followed by a ½ training for teachers
- September 2020: BIC Discussion
- September 2020: BoE Study-Session
- Ongoing support and learning planned moving forward through Learning Specialists, building FastBridge Trainers, LST, and with online resources

Beyond the Powerful Teacher Use

Aggregated data can be used

- By administrators to check progress and predict outcomes
- Specifically related to the BOE, it can be used to communicate the progression of goals

It is important to remember that FastBridge is part of a Balanced Assessment System and recognize that various assessments have unique purposes

What is Being Assessed?

FastBridge will be used to screen

- Math skills in grades 1 8
- Reading skills in grades 1 8
- and most likely social and emotional behaviors in grades K - 12

The screeners can be given remotely.

Also important to note:

- The screeners for Math and ELA are only 20 30 minutes each.
- There are <u>Diagnostic</u> assessments for students "at risk", most likely administered by a support teacher, Interventionist, or Learning Specialist
- > There are <u>progress monitoring</u> tools
- There are research-based intervention suggestions for whole group, small group, and individuals

How will the data be used?

As part of a Balanced Assessment System, benchmark assessment data is most powerful for teachers, driving instructional decisions.

- As a screener, it will be used 3 times per year to identify students not on track
- The diagnostic will be used for those students identified at risk to determine any gaps in skills. In addition, the intervention suggestions along with the progress monitoring gives teachers the skills needed to use the data.

Series 1 Bond Issuance Timeline

- Board adopts Series 1, 2020 School Building & Site Bonds Authorizing Resolution on August 20, 2020.
- Senior managing underwriter, J.P. Morgan Securities, selected via competitive, qualified bids. Board approved on August 20, 2020.
- f x Preliminary official statement data gathering with multiple drafts and reviews.
- Due diligence call on September 8, 2020 to review timeline and draft preliminary official statement information; continue edits/updates.
- Credit package submitted to bond insurers and rating agency.
- Rating Agency Conference call.
- Preliminary Official Statement published by mid-September.
- ☐ Receive rating.
- As soon as possible AND when parameters are met, pricing of bonds will occur.
- Execute bond purchase agreement.
- Finalize and publish final official statement, first part of October.
- Prepare & execute closing letter.
- Bond closing, as early as mid-October and receive bond proceeds.
