Overview

Purpose of online survey:

- Measure the amount of public support for Bloomfield Hills Schools to continue dialogue with Oakland County Parks about this potential partnership.
- Determine community priorities related to Bowers School Farm and the Johnson Nature Center.
- Analyze how often these facilities are visited and the different ways visitors use them.

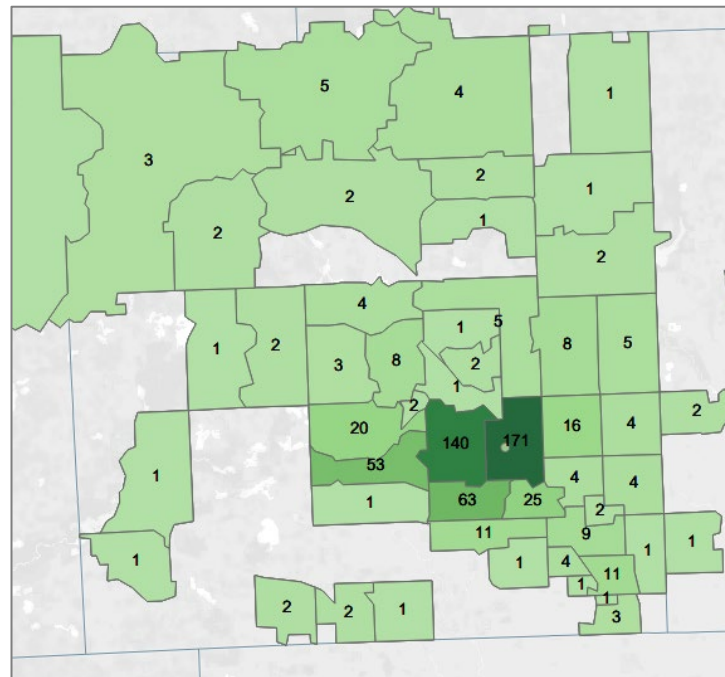
Community Feedback at a Glance

- Engagement Overview:
 - Nearly **750 participants** (646 complete, valid online responses, 80 in-person)
- Opinions on Potential Partnership:
 - **61% in support**
 - 25% need more information to decide
 - **14% not in support**
 - These groups of participants are most opposed by percentage:
 - Residents of zipcodes in Bloomfield Township (21%)
 - Respondents who have donated money to the Johnson Nature Center (21%)
 - Respondents who have never visited Bowers School Farm (23%)
- Community Priorities:
 - Participants highly **value agriculture education, weekend events, natural areas/trails, and youth education opportunities**
 - Popular activities include the **farm store and kitchen, Fall Festival, field trips, and hiking**
- Differences by Group:
 - The following factors influence results: the **age** of the participant, whether the participant has **children under 19 y/o**, **how often they visit** the locations, and whether they are **in support of the potential partnership**

Participant Demographics

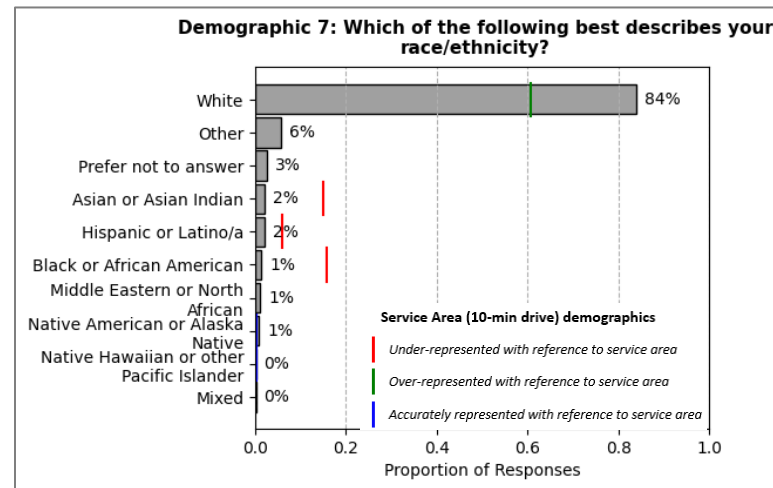
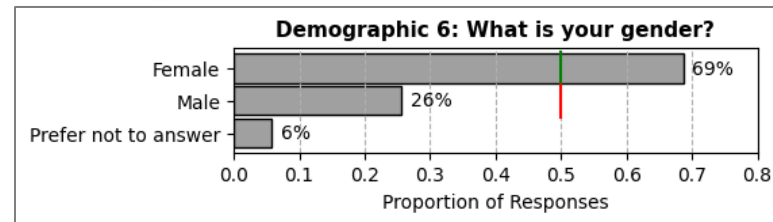
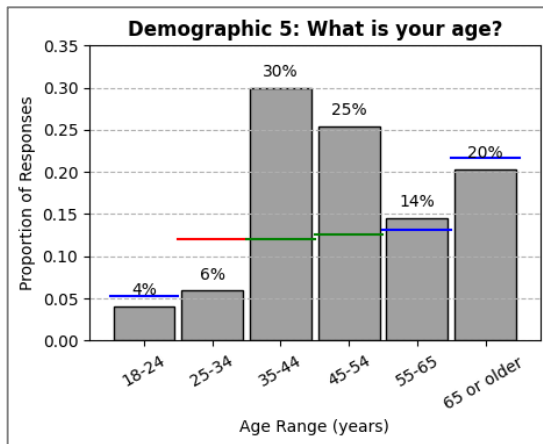
- **97% live within Oakland County**
 - **32% live in Bloomfield Township**
 - **27% live in Bloomfield Hills**
- **68% live within Bloomfield Hills Schools** district boundaries
- **41% are a parent or guardian** of a child currently enrolled in Bloomfield Hills Schools
- **56% have children** under 19 years old in their household
 - Most common child age range is 6-11 years

A few responses are from areas outside map boundaries



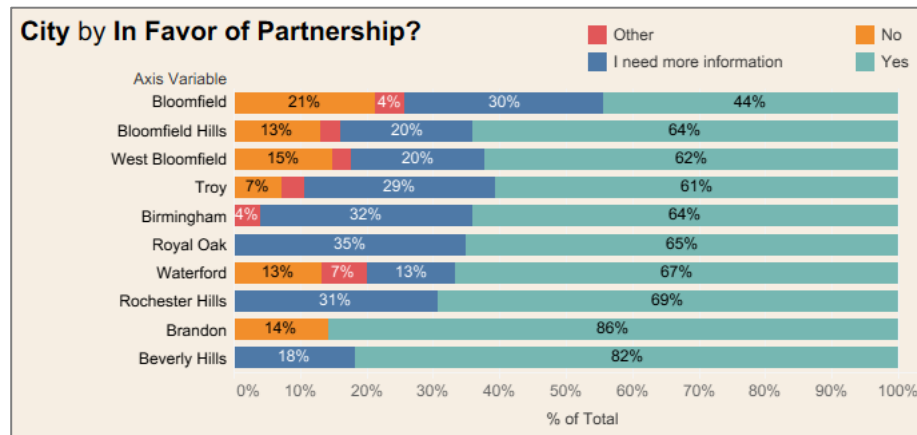
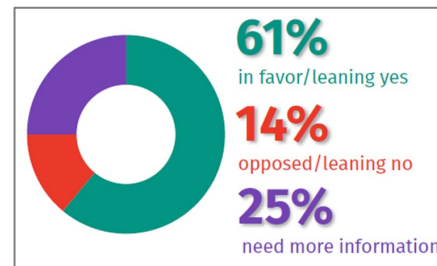
Representation

- The 35-54 y/o age range is greatly over-represented compared to the 10-minute drive service areas for both facilities
 - The 25-34 y/o age range is under-represented
- Participants overwhelmingly identify as female and are over-represented relative to the service area
- White participants are over-represented relative to the service area, while Black, Hispanic, and Asian respondents are under-represented.



Opinions on Potential Partnership

- **61% in favor** (includes 59% “yes”, 1.5% “yes, with conditions”, and 0.5% “leaning yes”)
- 25% need more information to decide
- **14% opposed**
- These groups of respondents are most opposed:
 - Residents of zipcodes in Bloomfield Township (21%)
 - Respondents who have donated money to the Johnson Nature Center (21%)
 - Respondents who have never visited Bowers School Farm (23%)

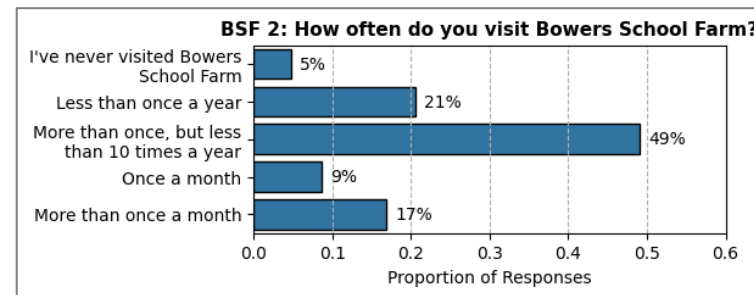
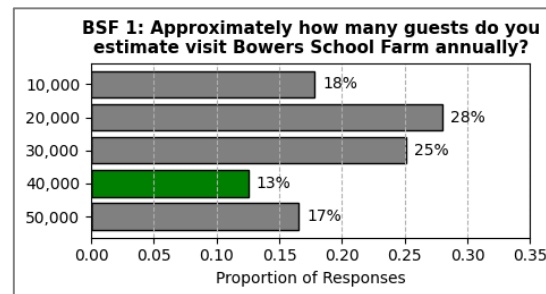

Q1. Approximately how many guests do you estimate visit Bowers School Farm annually?

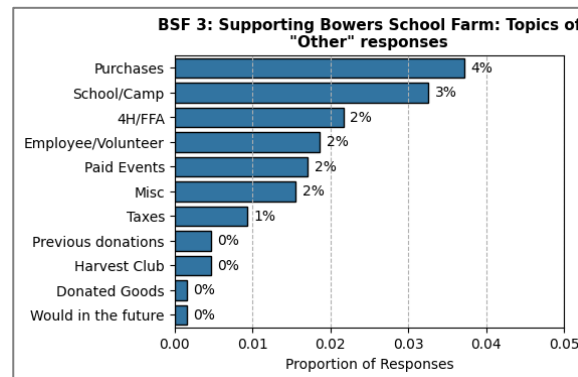
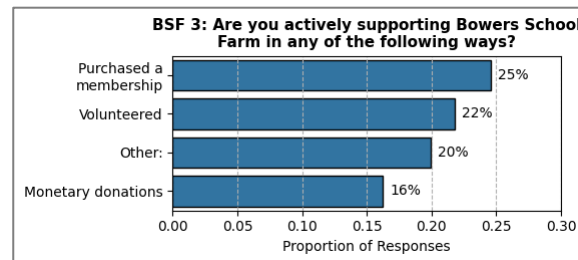
Q2. How often do you visit Bowers School Farm?

- 13% of participants guessed correctly that Bowers School Farm sees 40,000 visitors annually
- 49% of participants visit Bowers School Farm more than once but less than 10 times per year
- 17% visit more than once per month
- 5% have never visited

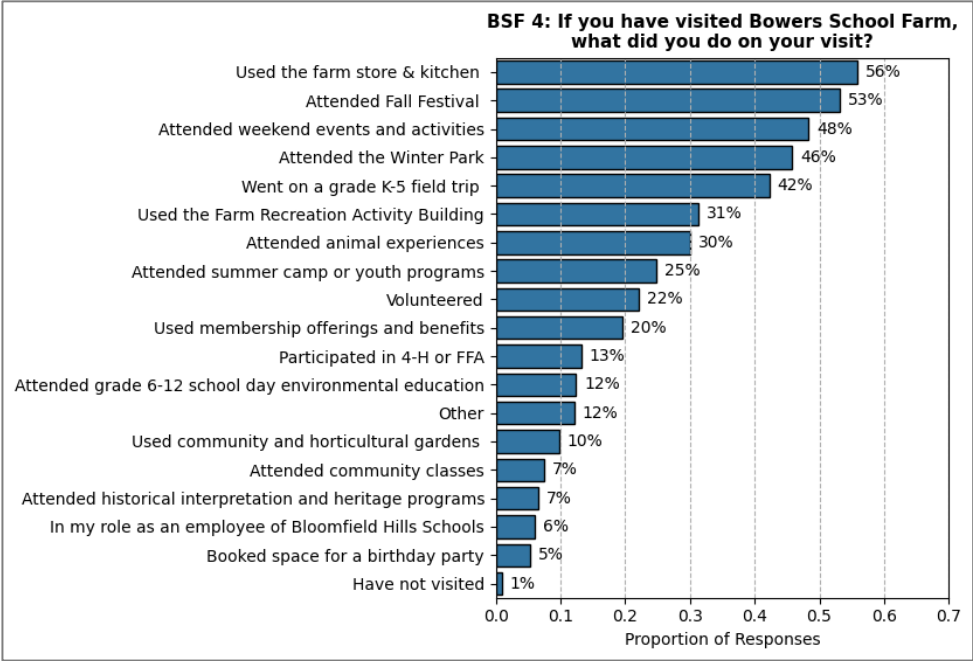


Q3. Are you actively supporting Bowers School Farm in any of the following ways?

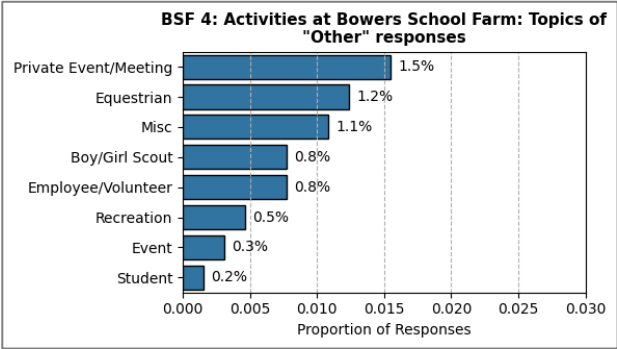
- 83% of participants say they actively support Bowers School Farm in some way
- 25% have purchased a membership
- 22% have volunteered
- 16% have made monetary donations
- 20% contribute in some other way:

 - Attending school or camp
 - Various others



Q4. If you have visited Bowers School Farm, what did you do on your visit?

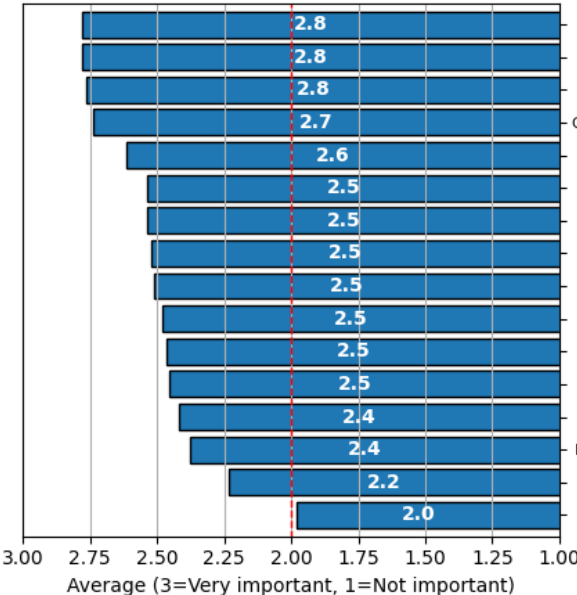


- 56% of participants have used the farm store and kitchen when visiting
- 53% have attended the Fall Festival and 46% have attended Winter Park

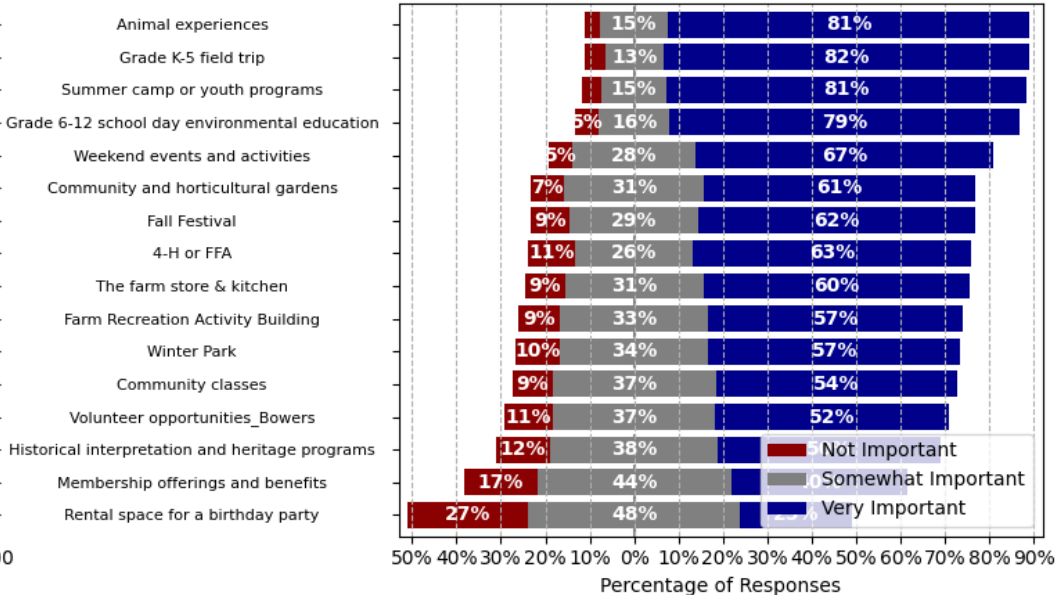


Q5. How important to you are the following Bowers School Farm offerings?

BSF 5: How important to you are the following Bowers School Farm offerings?

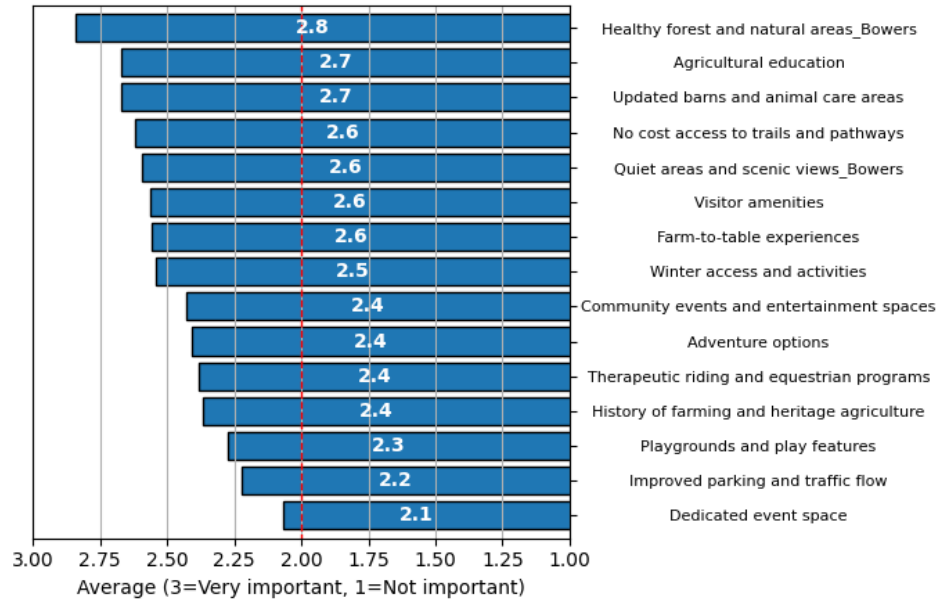

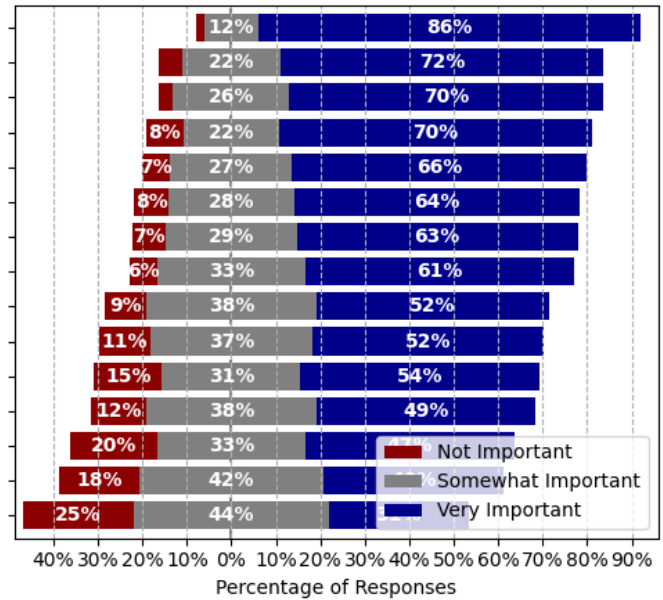


Q6. How important to you are the following features and activities?

BSF 6: How important to you are the following features and activities?

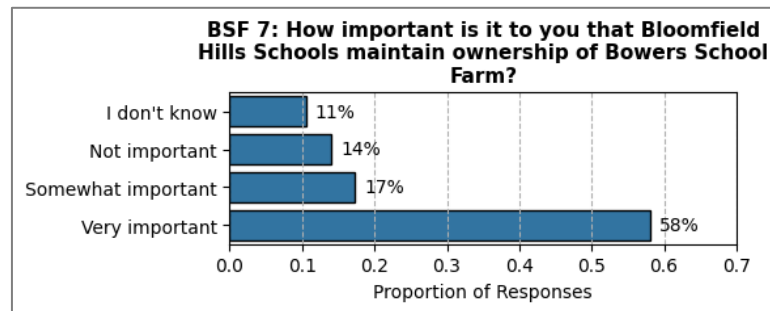

- 17% say it is somewhat important

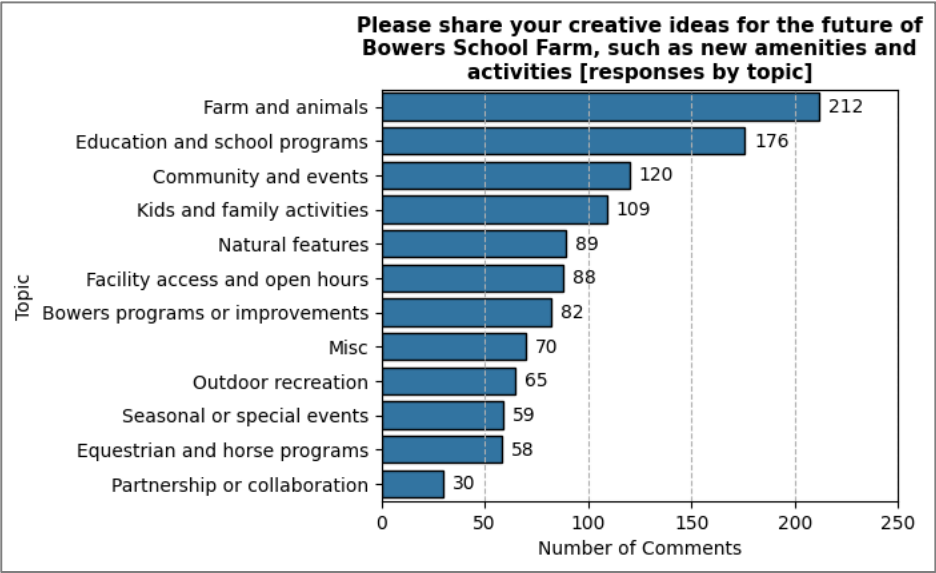


Q8. Please share your creative ideas for the future of Bowers School Farm, such as new amenities and activities.

Play structures and playground for children

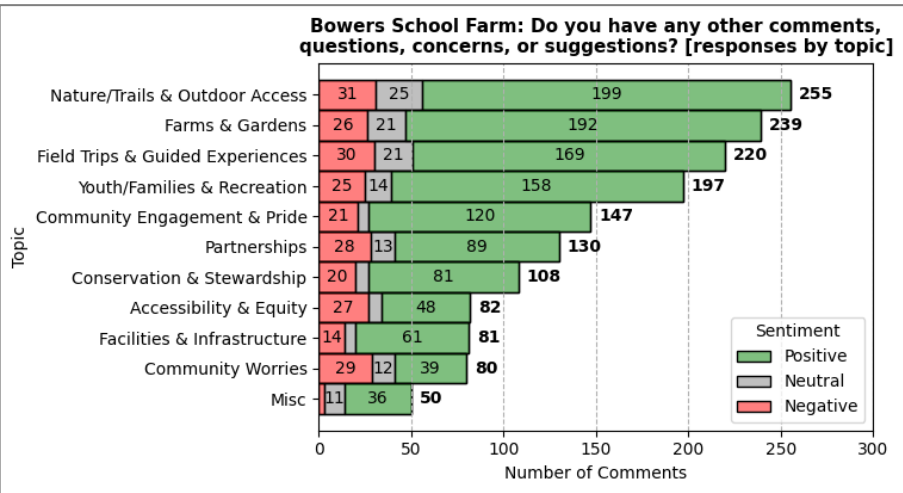
It would be great to have accessible trails for quiet walks

Expand curricular programs to grades 6-12. The programs seem mostly limited to grade schoolers

Camps are amazing but so difficult to get into. Perhaps a lottery selection would be better

Outdoor (green) spaces are more important than ever. We need to keep and maintain them for public use

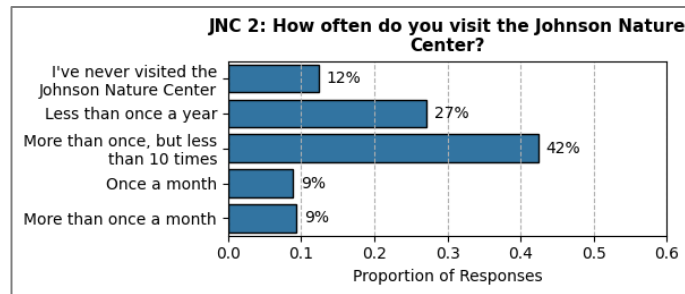
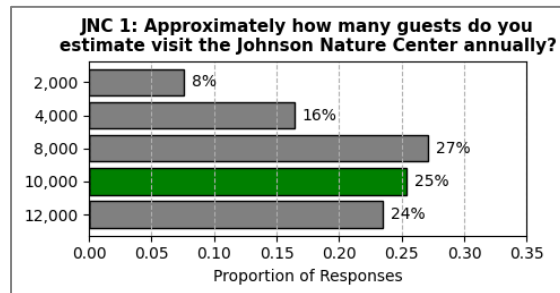

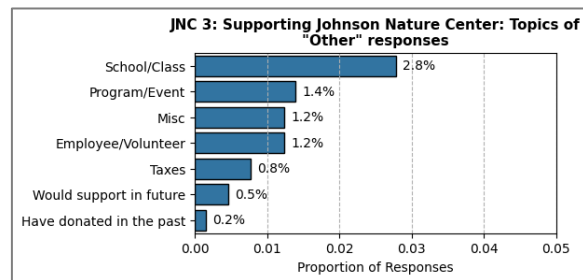
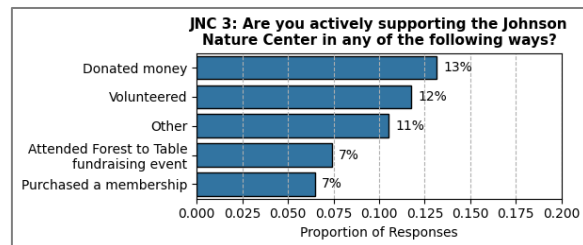
Q1. Approximately how many guests do you estimate visit the Johnson Nature Center annually?

- 25% of participants guessed correctly that the Johnson Nature Center sees 10,000 visitors annually
- 42% of participants visit the Johnson Nature Center more than once but less than 10 times per year
- 9% visit more than once per month
- 12% have never visited

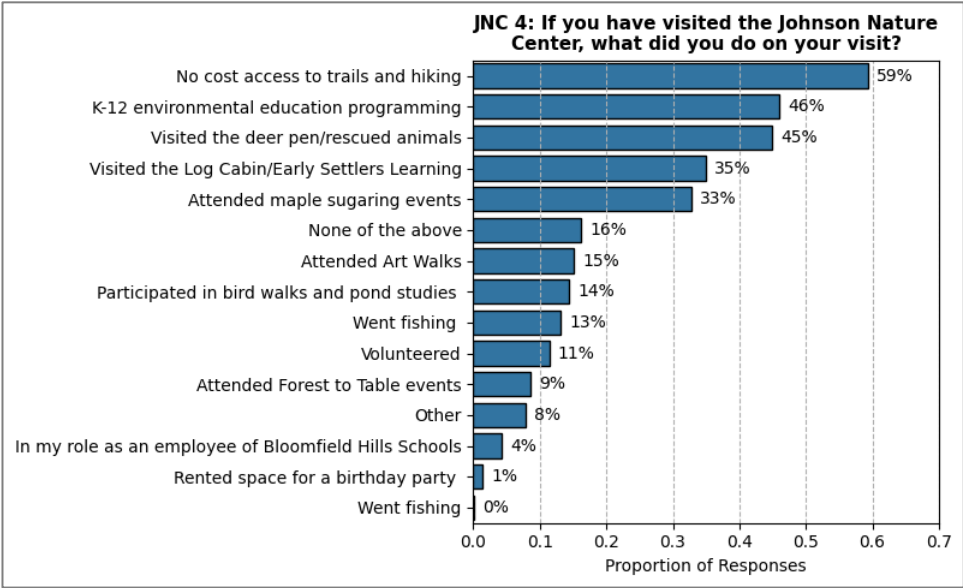


Q3. Are you actively supporting the Johnson Nature Center in any of the following ways?

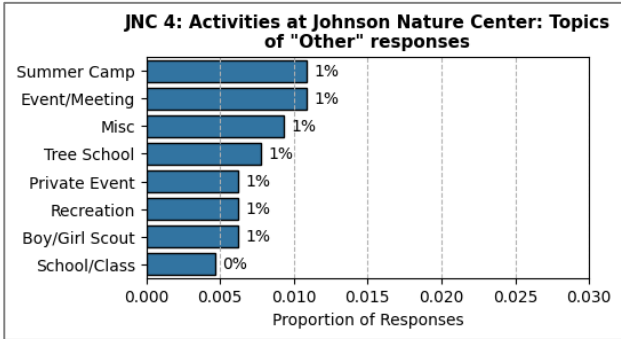
- 50% of participants say they actively support the Johnson Nature Center in some way

Q4. If you have visited the Johnson Nature Center, what did you do on your visit?

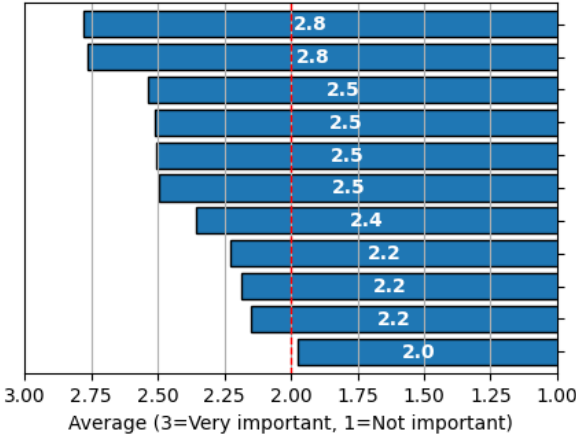


- 59% of participants have used the trails and hiking opportunities while visiting

- 45% have visited the deer pen/rescued animals



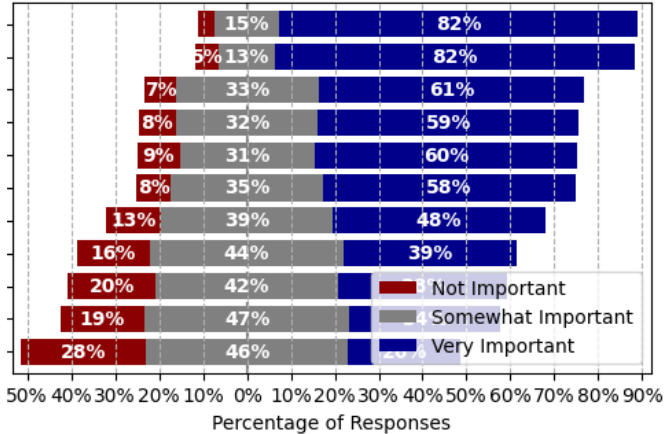

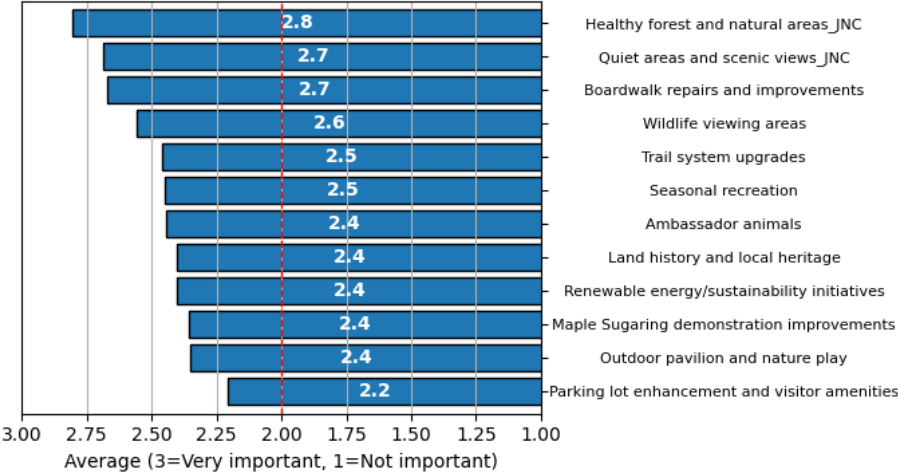

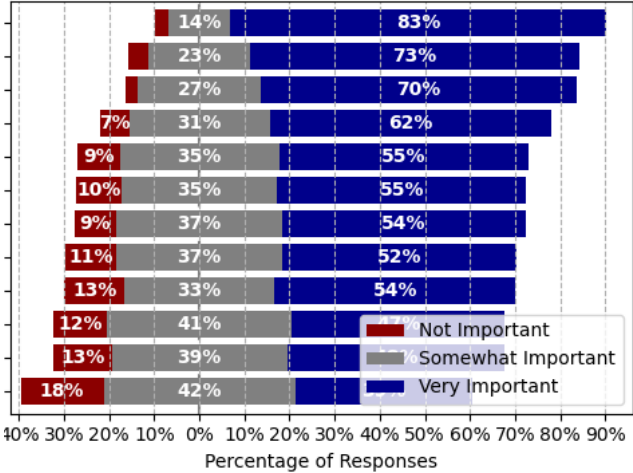


Q6. How important to you are the following features and activities?

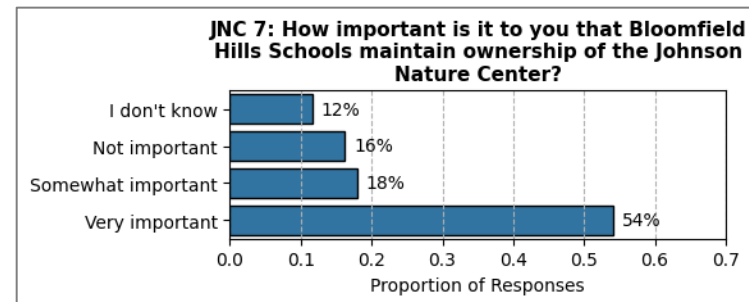

- 18% say it is somewhat important

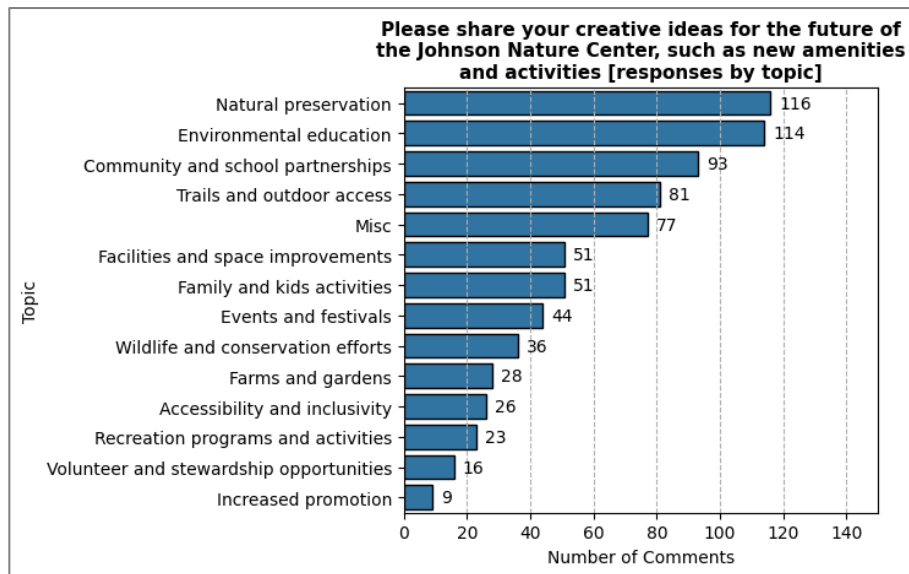


Q8. Please share your creative ideas for the future of the Johnson Nature Center, such as new amenities and activities.

Open hours extended



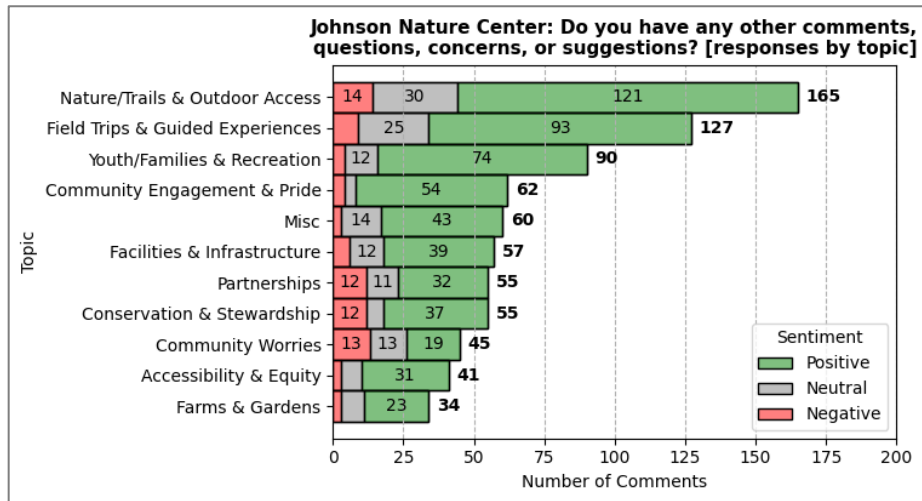
Guided hikes with naturalist....
